Rest and Relocation

As we enter the summer months, many will rest, and many will relocate. This reminds me of a story.

Once upon a time there was a businessman who ordered flowers to be sent to the opening of his friend's new branch office. When the businessman got there, he was shocked to see the flowers with the inscription. "Rest In Peace." He was so outraged that he

stopped at the florist to complain. "It could be worse," the florist said, "Just think: Today someone was buried beneath a floral arrangement with the inscription. 'Congratulations on Your New Location!'"

After the time following Jesus' relocation (resurrection), his twelve students (disciples) were thrust into becoming teachers (apostles). Perhaps much sooner than they expected. We read in the Acts of the Apostles (11:27-12:3) the account of the first martyred apostle, St. James. Herod the Great was incited by Jewish leaders to put down this insurrection so that they could find rest. They were weary of these followers of Jesus who were stirring up the masses and causing mayhem. Traditions and customs were not at risk, however. It was about people who wanted to hold on to their positions of power, wealth and prestige. When Herod saw that it pleased them, to put James' neck to the sword, he didn't stop.

Herod went after the head of the conspirators and proceeded to arrest Peter. The story gets better as the angel of the Lord appeared to Peter in prison and rescued him. Sending him safely to Caesarea is nothing short of amazing. Peter, and the continue this course of finding rest and relocation for a few more years before their eventual martyrdom, similar to the one faced by James. This was in order that the Gospel would continue to spread throughout the world. I believe they received flowers of both kinds, for them to, "Rest in peace" and "Congratulations on your new location."

As Christians we are always in the midst of rest and relocation. God is always calling upon us, to listen, to learn and to lead. Looking ahead, June will be a time for me to rest,...in peace (not the eternal kind) and quiet my mind. The Rector of Calvary has been leading a lot through management of our building, administration and programs. God has blessed me with top notch leaders and staff members who I trust completely. This year I am committed to intentionally rest. That means I will cut off my link to work related email and texts. I will not actively engage in social media to see what all of you are doing. It will be hard, but I must try. Thank you for allowing me this time to rest and relocate for a brief time. See you in July.

The Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Grant History

I want to provide you with additional history and facts of the Lilly Endowment:

Lilly Endowment Inc. was formally established in 1937 with gifts of stock in Eli Lilly and Company. The pharmaceutical firm was founded in Indianapolis in 1876 by Col. Eli Lilly, father of two sons, J.K. Sr. and Eli. The Endowment exists to support the causes of religion, education and community development. Lilly Endowment's religion grant is designed to deepen and enrich the religious lives of American Christians. It does this largely through initiatives to

enhance and sustain the quality of ministry in American congregations and parishes.

The first donations, back in 1937, of 17,500 shares were originally valued at \$262,500, but the giving of J.K. Sr. and his sons did not stop there. By 1971 their combined gifts (after stock splits) amounted to nearly 32 million shares valued at about \$94 million. Several nonfamily members contributed another 210,000 shares, valued at \$1.1 million. And the Endowment was included in the estate plan of Ruth Lilly, the daughter of J.K. Jr., resulting in gifts from her beginning in 2003 totaling more than \$200 million.

The Endowment during the past 80 years has made grants totaling nearly \$9.9 billion to 9,792 charitable organizations. At the end of 2017 the Endowment's assets totaled \$11.7 billion which will be used to benefit future generations.

Among J.K. Sr.'s favorite charities were the YMCA, the Community Fund and the Red Cross. He also donated significant time and resources to other educational, charitable and scientific endeavors, serving on the initial board of trustees for the Indianapolis Foundation and helping to establish and lead the Purdue Research Foundation. Young Eli – known as Mr. Eli in later years – gave millions of dollars to Indianapolis Episcopal churches, was a leader in organizing Indiana's chapter of the United Way, and contributed heavily to countless colleges and charitable organizations. He left virtually his

entire estate to charity, including gifts designated for the Indianapolis Museum of Art, The Indianapolis Children's Museum, the Indiana Historical Society, Christ Church Episcopal Cathedral and several educational institutions.

Another trait shared by the founders was a conviction that philanthropy was something to be quietly practiced and not heralded. J.K. Sr. summed it up for his sons with the admonition, "When you do something nice for people, do it in a nice way." His sons interpreted that advice to mean they should give quietly, thus explaining why the philanthropic foundation that bears their name has typically maintained a relatively low profile and encouraged any attention to be given to its grantees, their staffs and volunteers who actually do the charitable work supported by Endowment grants.

Romans 8:28: "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."

This passage is about God's goodness and our confidence that His plan will work out as He sees fit. Since His plan is always good, Christians can take confidence that, no matter our circumstances or environments, God is active and will conclude things according to His good and wise design. With this knowledge we can learn to be content (see Philippians 4:11). This is why we pray each Sunday in Church to hopefully receive this prestigious award.

Lilly Grant Prayer

If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation, everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! These were Paul's words to the people of Corinth (Cor 5:17) what a glorious promise to us that everything has been made new, the old has passed away.

Each week in the prayer of the people we have been praying for renewal of our congregation the application to the 2019 Lilly Endowment, National Clergy Renewal Program. This is a grant program providing up to \$50,000 for congregational renewal. The program seeks to strengthen Christian congregations by providing opportunities for pastors to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily parish life by engaging in a period of renewal and reflection. Funds granted can also be used for a supply priest, ongoing and increased staffing needs and other needs for congregational renewal. The Lilly endowment grant application details those renewal periods are not vacations, but times for exploration and reflection, for regaining the enthusiasm and creativity for ministry.

Intellectually, our parish understood the need for sabbatical. It was built into the contract created for the priest that was to be called to lead our congregation at Calvary. We rejoice in the Spirit that we can honor not only the contract, but the ministry that Father Jon's life has become to our lives. For all that he sacrifices daily in mind, body in spirit in his life at Calvary; the time away from his family and putting the others needs before his own to touch each our hearts and spiritual wellbeing. In every encounter we can see his deep emotion and love for Christ. We know that upon his return he will be renewed with the Holy Spirit which will benefit our congregation beyond all measure.

Please continue to pray for the approval of the Lily grant proposal for the renewal of our parish, Father Jon and the entire Roberts family. Keeping in your daily prayers the verse from Romans 8:28 "we know that for those who love God all things work together for the good of those called according to his purpose"

Since gifts were provided to afford a Youth Minister at the Annual Parish Meeting on January 27, we have posted the job on The Episcopal News network (TEN), The Diocese of Southwest Florida website and the Calvary websites (including Facebook and Nextdoor). Indeed, the online job search engine has generated the most activity from a broad range of candidates, totaling a half dozen to date.



You may have also noticed that we have included the search for a new Youth Minister in our Sunday prayers, praying that God will lead the right person to this calling.

In addition, Fr. Jon and the Vestry have asked five parishioners if they would consider the position. We feel that we have been most comprehensive and inclusive. We are also certain that these efforts will near an end, and will continue the search until July. If you know of any qualified individual(s) please do not hesitate to direct them to Lisa Kingston.

The Search Committee members include, Lisa Kingston, Karen Hillegas, Lynne Roberts and Fr. Jon.

Responsibilities include creating a yearly vision for the Calvary youth ministry program; design and oversee creative Sunday worship/Bible study programming for all children in the church; plan, coordinate and lead weekly events including weekly gatherings, ongoing Bible studies and volunteer training for our middle and high school students; create and coordinate meaningful special events such as mission trips, retreats, and service projects; build relationships with youth and their families through direct communication including communicating regularly with youth, parents, and staff through social media, the church's website, and other forums to advertise events and furthering the youth programming agenda; provide information and encourage participation in DaySpring camps and weekends; be an active member of and provide information to the Christian Education Commission regarding youth activities, curriculum, and budget.

We are going to close the search during the first week of July and make a decision on who is best qualified, in all who have been presented until then.



Smooth Sailing Ahead - The CFAE Sets Its Course

As we quickly approach summer, we find several of our Committee members, "pulling up anchor," and leaving the area for vacations and northern visits – some to return sooner than later, others their usual 3-6 months here and 3-6 months there. We miss you, Kathy, Judy, Julie and Tim, Jo, and new members Leslie and Sandra. However, Matt, Liz, Denna and Chuck will keep on planning and keeping you informed of our progress, always welcoming hearing from you and your ideas. Thank you for your continued support and enjoy your time boating, cruising, walking, flying or just visiting. May it all be blessed by our "Dear Lord and Savior" and may you return to us safely, smoothly and SOON! Here's what's been happening as we continue to chart our course:



April 12th meeting provided a time for us to meet and summarize the performance night of Apollo XIII. Area by area was covered with critiques, ideas and suggestions for improvement (what worked, what didn't work), excluding parking since no one was available to report about that. Liz will be in touch with Chuck, David, and John Paul. Door coverage was good with 4 people (1 with vase tagged "Love Offering") at each entrance. Suggestion: doors locked until ½ hour prior to performance then unlocked and special guests, then remainder of guests ushered to their seats. Guests who have health issues may use seats in shade outside or Barge Hall for sitting. Bottled water available for sale, possibly. All agreed that there would be no rehearsal past 5:30PM.

Jo provided a spread sheet of our financial status to date. She said that donations were still coming in and all bills had not been paid to date. She will hope to have another update for the next meeting.

The Committee continued to critique the first event for CFAE: rope, ribbon (cordon off) to be used for reserved seats and 1 or 2 people at each end of those pews; remind groups who normally reserve church that there will be no meetings the date of the event; food set aside for cast; at end and before reception, cast guided to tables first, then special guests, then others; remind Father Jon that new castors are needed on altar; take picture of altar before take down and after intermission at 3 entrances with volunteers and AFTER performance, prior to reception; offering baskets on reception buffet tables; AC on high prior to opening – no fans due to acoustic interference. All preceding suggestions were agreed upon by those present.

Kathy presented the following re reception: Offer beverages first and guide guests away from food buffet "rush"; wine – 3 selections only (large bottles only since small bottles take more time to open and people have to wait); 2-sided label cards for 2-sided buffet items; Liz added that 10 additional volunteers were missing from reception- illness and "no show" but were definitely needed for next event, including chairperson/co-chairperson; lastly, discussion followed re thank you notes and an after performance party – perhaps 4/28 from 5 –8pm.

It was noted at the May 1st meeting (Apollo XIII), that extra programs were needed. Matt said he would see that we have extras for sponsors, etc. and that the DVD would soon be ready after editing, then made into CDs, then available for sale. Denna emphasized that the pre event publicity had a definite positive result in attendance when Liz shared the "post publicity" photo/cutline with the Committee. (Beach Bee).

Jo gave a report that a budget of \$5,000 was set for Apollo XIII. Revenue from donations was a total of \$4744 and expenses (majority in) totaled \$4416. Bottom line: All costs covered under budget to date.

Ideas for continuing the series for CFAE early Fall and on were also discussed and have spurred on Matt and Liz to begin setting dates, themes and contacting musicians/artists, and volunteers. Some of the events being considered are: Trio of piano, harp, female soloist, Chamber ensemble with flute, piano, cello, Suncoast Symphony, Dr. Otto Band, (smooth jazz quartet), Paradise Brass (return for Winterfest), Gospel Choir, art exhibition with classical guitar, harp or piano. Plans to turn the reception into a way to create more funds via beverage sales, raffle, door prizes will be considered for the events. Most important to consider: Keeping future performances at same level of theme/interest/enthusiasm/attendance.

We hope to confirm dates and at least the next 2 performances by Friday, June 7th. The CFAE committee will welcome you gladly to join us all as we chart our course to benefit our Calvary by bringing the arts to our beaches!

Shining Light Garden

Pulling Weeds, planting or harvesting at an 18 acre farm that donates 100% of product to the needy.

TC Food Bank

Sorting food on a massive distribution scale that serves the whole treasure coast.

Abbie Jean Russel Care Center

Playing outdoor games and having visitation with elderly at a local care center.

HALO Animal Rescue/ Dogs & Cats Forever

Cleaning and caring for abandoned and abused animals. Assisting in dog care and organization at a no-kill shelter.

Feed the Lambs/GYAC

Provide recreation, education and mentorship services for underprivileged children. Recreation with at risk and low income children in a summer camp program.

Door-to-door visitation at a low income elderly community. Window washing, praying and socializing with residents.

MFI

Cleaning airplanes, preparing shipments to missionary families; cleaning pill bottles for Haitian clinics.

Working in a migrant farming community with children that are facing homelessness.

Habitat for Humanity Restore/Salvation Army Restore

Many of you have been in a church where visitors are asked not to be shy, to stand and tell everyone who they are and where they are from. It doesn't work for all churches, but he felt it would work for Calvary. Since he started the practice in May, we have become more attentive when we see and hear visitors introduce themselves. The Visitor Cards are marvelous only when they are completed and turned in. Let us continue to extend warm welcomes to all those who visit and worship with us.

What does it take?

"How does a person become a member", you may ask? There is some bit of formality to it. They meet with the Rector and say, "I would like to become a member," at which time Fr. Jon would ask them a few interested questions about what led them to that decision. He then extends a hand of personal welcome, followed by an official letter receiving them into the church. That's it!

Let's take a step back for a moment to see what it takes for a visitor to get to that place where they want to join us as a member.

First and foremost, every prospective member seems to say, "I just felt this was the right place." That could mean they liked the worship service as it relates to something ancient and sacred. Property Report

April 2019

- 1. The new Viscount organ experienced a faulty CPU board and needed to be removed for repair. It turns out that there was simply a bad solder joint on the electrical board that supplies power. We were without for five weeks and it came back to us, May 2nd.
- 2. Although the Nursery glass was frosted last month, to reduce sight for the children to look out and see their parents, it did not effectively deal with the noise factor. Palm Sunday was very loud, due in part to older children being in there and also in part to them opening and closing the doors. Elyssa's earlier request for fabrication of a half-wall will now be revisited. Fr. Jon will contact Craig Price, a trusted worker we have used in the past to get to work. \$3,000 was approved by the Vestry and presented to FC.
- 3. John Paul Malicinski (JP) has been a dynamo for us! We afforded his labor and material cost to do all of our signage projects as well as improving the Dropbox system. We now have three (3) handsome, secure and fully operational collection points at our North and West lots. He has also used his welding talents to refurbish the front Marque. Fr. Jon has made numerous visits to Extreme Signs, working with Toni and Vicki, the owners, in the fabrication of new graphics. He also worked with them in fabricating four (4) new High Density Urethane (HDU) signs on Gulf Blvd., 16th, 17th, and 18th along First St. This is one of our greatest improvements yet.
- 4. JP restriped half of the north lot just prior to Beachfest upon Fr. Jon's request as we were at risk, parking the public on that busy day;
- 5. The Dishwasher continues to work well on Sundays but we are in need of more volunteers to sign up on Sundays and learn how to operate;
- 6. We had the motor blow out of the HVAC that serves half the church. It was out from Apollo XIII to Palm Sunday. Fortunately, it was repaired by Easter. Cost \$1,000.
- 7. Harvey Brillat has designed an approved lettering to honor Gene Chapman, naming the Columbarium after him. This lettering will go inside the Chapel above the stained glass windows;

There are lots of projects at the church for volunteers as well. Please don't hesitate to apply.

Things to accomplish before end of Summer:

- 1. Pour & spread a gravel, install new materials on south lot to improve parking;
- 2. Install sectional, pvc picket fencing on south lot, preventing public access over grass;
- 3. Negotiate new housekeeping contract with someone "in house."
- 4. Evaluate our landscaping contract;
- 5. Evaluate sprinkler system and make needed repairs;
- 6. Install smaller dishwasher in Barge Hall or Parish Hall kitchen;
- 7. Install new Calvary street signs (4);
- 8. Install new donation boxes (3);
- 9. Improve front marquee signboard;
- 10. Re-stripe parking lines in north lot;

Parking Lot Update

Thanks to the generosity of a member of our parish, four High Density Urethane signs were provided, totaling \$4,200. Fr. Jon designed them to complement the advertising and character of all our other signage, including the website. The Episcopal shield proudly stands above our welcome to all who pass by, inviting them to visit us. We thank JP Malicinski who provided the labor and know-how in the installation and to Extreme Signs in Seminole who provided graphic layout and fabrication.

Signs are located on Gulf Blvd, 16th & 18th St. intersections with First St., and the entrance to the north parking lot.

The Vestry approved to spend \$10,000 on parking lot improvements which includes a north and south lot perimeter 3' fencing as seen here. Studies have shown a significant traffic pattern and increase to ~400 cars parking on our lot every week, from those parking to go to the beach. The fence will help reinforce where our property boundaries are to visitors who park and to get the point across that donations are expected for that privilege. Several parkers will stay at the remote north end and walk through our corner on 18th. A gate, beside the dropbox for donations will be unavoidable. As we have shared before. there is great opportunity here for evangelism and we continue to ask for volunteers who can come over on a Saturday or Sunday and place invitation cards in windshields of beach going folks. We tell them, "If you like parking in our lot, you'll love parking in our pews!"

If you would like to assist in the annual Octoberfest Parking Lot fundraiser, please see Fr. Jon for details. We anticipate parking nearly 400 cars on that day, Saturday, October 12th,

ALL DAY. Funds go to support our youth programs. Octoberfest will be on the same day as our Diocesan Convention in Punta Gorda.




Easy Online Member Giving




