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Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (Collect for Palm Sunday)

### Holy Humiliation

When thinking about God's plan for the Church, it is humbling to know that in order for it to grow, it sometimes requires a little humiliation.

Back in the 90's I heard the American comedian, Emo Philips say the following joke that humiliates the legacy of the Church.

"Once I saw this guy on a bridge about to jump. I said, "Don't do it!" He said, "Nobody loves me." I said, "God loves you. Do you

believe in God?" He said, "Yes." I said, "Are you a Christian or a Jew?" He said, "A Christian." I said, "Me, too! Protestant or Catholic?" He said, "Protestant." I said, "Me, too! What franchise?" He said, "Baptist." I said, "Me, too! Northern Baptist or Southern Baptist?" He said, "Northern Baptist." I said, "Me, too! Northern Conservative Baptist or Northern Liberal Baptist?"

He said, "Northern Conservative Baptist." I said, "Me, too! Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region, or Northern Conservative Baptist Eastern Region?" He said, "Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region." I said, "Me, too!" Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region Council of 1879, or Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region Council of 1912?" He said, "Northern Conservative Baptist Great Lakes Region Council of 1912." I said, "Die, heretic!" And I pushed him over."

On Palm Sunday, Jesus told his disciples to go to Jerusalem, and there they would find a colt (St. Luke) or a donkey (Sts. Mark & Matthew) for him to ride during his expected triumphal entrance into the Holy City. This was clearly a gesture of humility, entering on such an animal, and also one of prophecy. You would expect something greater, however, for a king to ride into the great city of Jerusalem. If you didn't know the story of Jesus, you would say it was a humiliating account for one who is acclaimed to be the Messiah. Shouldn't he have a beautiful horse, or at least a camel, riding up high and mighty? But throughout his story, three years from Galilee to this point, he rode something much more difficult. He rode a fine line between humility and humiliation.

Some Rabbis wondered if he belonged to their claim of Jewish tradition, their heritage and relation to God. They were looking to push him over and say, "Die heretic!" He was a Jew, one of them, but was he a Sadducee a Pharisee or Essene, or from another sect? Was he north or south of the great lake of Galilee, or from the prophetic places of Sinai, Jerusalem, Bethlehem or another city? Every time he turned the corner there were those who loved him, encouraged him and wanting him to be glorified, while lurking nearby those who wanted to push him over the edge.

I am so thankful that the ecumenical fervor of self-righteous religion and indignation has died down a good bit lately. Churches seem to be getting along, for the most part, saying less ugly comments about the shortcomings of theology or practices, and judging other denominations as heretical ("wrong-teachers"). Perhaps it is because the church has been humiliated with sexual abuse scandals and reports of financial impropriety read at local newsstands. Then again, we can attribute much to the spirit of the age for the reason why Christians cannot afford to poke at each other as much. There are simply more atheists and agnostics growing in our population than those who believe in Jesus in this post-Christian era. There are more of those looking down from the edge of a millennial age than those of us "North of the Equator", post-1945 Christians, looking up.

Are there things about Christianity that embarrass and humiliate us to the point that we are not able to share the Good News with the world? Are we only able to share with those of likeness, or further yet, identical to our own beliefs? If so, maybe that is the heresy we need to resist today. God rode freely in the midst of opposition. He knew who was out to get him and yet he continued to be subject to eventual humiliation on a cross. As we move out of Lent and into Holy Week, let us all be reminded that humility comes from walking in the way of his suffering, at the risk of humiliation. See you at the Cross. Looking forward to Holy Week and Easter.

# Christian Education

## **Cyril of Jerusalem**

As we enter into Holy Week this year, it may be helpful for you to understand which Christian was primarily responsible for beginning liturgical practices such as Palm Sunday or Stations of the Cross.

“Strengthen, O God, your Church in the sacraments of your grace, that we, in union with the teaching and prayers of your servant Cyril of Jerusalem, may enter more fully into your Paschal mystery; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.”

Collect for Cyril, Liturgist, Catechist and Bishop of Jerusalem, 386 AD. His “Feast Day” was March 18<sup>th</sup>.

Cyril was born in Jerusalem around 315, and became bishop of that city in about 349. The years between the Council of Nicea (325) and the Council of Constantinople (381) were troubled years, in which the Church, having committed itself at Nicea, over the strenuous protests of the Arians, to the proposition that the Son is "one in being" (Homo-ousios) with the Father, began to backtrack and consider whether there was some other formula that would adequately express the Lordship of Christ but not be "divisive." Experience with other ways of stating what Christians believed about the Son and his relation to the Father finally led the Church to conclude that the Nicene formulation was the only way of safeguarding the doctrine that Thomas spoke truly (John 20:28) when he said to Jesus, "My Lord and My God!" But this was not obvious from the beginning, and Cyril was among those who looked for a way of expressing the doctrine that would be acceptable to all parties. As a result, he was exiled from his bishopric three times, for a total of sixteen years, once by the Athanasians and twice by the Arians. He eventually came to the conclusion, as did most other Christians of the time, that there was no alternative to the Nicene formula, and in 381 he attended the Council of Constantinople and voted for that position.

Cyril is author of the Catecheses, or Catechetical Lectures on the Christian Faith. These consist of an introductory lecture, then eighteen lectures on the Christian Faith to be delivered during Lent to those about to be baptized at Easter, and then five lectures on the Sacraments to be delivered after Easter to the newly baptized. These have been translated into English (F L Cross, 1951), and are the oldest such lectures surviving. (It is thought that they were used over and over by Cyril and his successors, and that they may have undergone some revision in the process.)

Every year, thousands of Christian pilgrims came to Jerusalem, especially for Holy Week. It is probably Cyril who instituted the liturgical forms for that week as they were observed in Jerusalem at the pilgrimage sites, were spread to other churches by returning pilgrims, and have come down to us today, with the procession with palms on Palm Sunday, and the services for the following days, culminating in the celebration of the Resurrection on Easter Sunday. We have a detailed account of Holy Week observances in Jerusalem in the fourth century, thanks to a Spanish nun named Egeria who made a pilgrimage to Jerusalem and kept a journal which is a historian's delight.

## **“The Bible Project”**



## **Palm Crosses Prep**





What a busy year 2019 has been for the Food Pantry and myself with the transition of returning as Director. Under the guidance of Dave Kline, our previous Director of the Food Pantry and Vestry Liaison of Missions, we also went through a rough time during the government shutdown last January.

Fortunately, with all the blessings from our parishioners and the community we made it without having to close a single day of operation; even with an influx of new patrons during that stressful time.

Unfortunately, we are losing one of our most valued volunteers, Joan Bertrand. She is moving back to Colorado to be closer to her family. Joan is our Volunteer Coordinator along with many other various assignments. I am now looking for someone who may have some time, and who would like to work with our volunteers, scheduling our daily shoppers, and also for obtaining volunteers for special events. And as always, we do have a need for more summer volunteers as we do struggle when our winter group moves back north. Due to this migration we are having a special luncheon for them to say Thank You for all their hard work as well as for all our year-round volunteers who are always there for us. There would be NO Beach Community Food Pantry without our volunteers.

We have participated at several events in the community passing out our pamphlets and signing up new volunteers. Church of the Isles had their Greenfest in March and it was one of the great events where we were able to sign up 6 new volunteers. Special thanks to the A2K organization donating flower plants for us to sell as we were able to make over \$200 in donations.

Our annual Fabulous Fish Fry is approaching us on April 13<sup>th</sup> in the Parish Hall. Food is provided by Crabby Bills who does all the cooking right on site so you don't get any fresher. They donate 100 percent of all proceeds to our Food Pantry. It was such a HUGE success last year that we are sure this will be even better. Tickets are on sale after church at the front office, or with one of our pantry volunteers during hospitality hour. Tickets are \$10 in advance or \$12 at the door. That includes a large piece of white fish, french-fries, hushpuppies, a cookie, and water tea and soda. There will also be beer and wine for sale.

The US Post Office Mail Food Drive is also coming up May 11<sup>th</sup> and we will most certainly be looking for some great volunteers to help with checking expiration date, any open containers marking bar codes and of course sorting the items. The more volunteers the faster the job goes for everyone.

BeachFest, put on by the Indian Rocks Home Owners Association, on April 27<sup>th</sup>, is our biggest fund raiser of the year. This year we were asked to man 2 tents, one selling Hot dogs, Water and Soda, and the other just Water and Soda. We will need many volunteers for this event. It is also a great time to get your beach time in but please carpool or if you can be dropped off as the Youth of our church will be raising money, \$10/car for people to park at Calvary. They need every space possible.

# Property

## Property Report

March 2019

1. The new Viscount organ experienced a faulty CPU board and needed to be removed for repair. It is under one year and full warranty by Peter Kinsey. A loaner was provided at no expense to the Church. Matthew hopes to have it returned and in good order by Easter;
2. Mark Roth installed new LED lighting, nearly 240 bulbs total, to get us to 98% overall for our entire campus. This complements the work done by Kim Heinicka and D'Andrea Electric over the last couple of years. Most of the lights in the exterior soffits were changed as well, giving us added security and enhancement. Mark removed all the ballasts from the hallway lighting, swapped out older light receptacles in some areas (bathrooms) with new LEDs. He and Kim disposed of all ballasts and bulbs appropriately and safely;
3. Kim & Mark were able to separate two electrical feeds for lighting in the main church. This is important because we can now have more control over how much light can be shone at services that benefit from less (i.e. Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, etc.);
4. Mark replaced all the vinyl soffit in the Loft;
5. Kim "frosted" the nursery glass, 38", to give playing children privacy and security. The Laun family told us it worked great for their toddler during Sunday. The Vestry approved \$3,000 to do this project, that included design of a fixed glass and pony wall combination. Kim's idea cost \$40;
6. Ralph Kiphuth changed out a few of our sanctuary bulbs to new LED;
7. David Kline and Julie Heinicka did outstanding work to clean out the old Food Pantry, used by the Food Pantry purposes and the November Yard Sale event. This room is expected to be thoroughly cleaned and "re-evaluated" for its use;
8. David Kline received final approval on BCFP van design from Fr. Jon and the Vestry and completed the new detail. It looks fantastic!
9. John Paul Malicinski (JP) filled in a low lying hole entering our south parking lot where cars potentially could bottom-out. In the meantime, he has met with City of IRB official to investigate a permeable substrate with a more functional surface for future parking. Permit is expected. Turnaround time to complete before summer;
10. JP met with Fr. Jon on several occasions to design and implement the renovation of three Calvary signs (Gulf, South & North corners) and one new one (entrance into North Lot). The new signs will be solar lit, pvc clad and HU "carved" decorative. Permission from Guppys was received by Fr. Jon in writing for placement/return of the Gulf Blvd. sign;
11. JP met with Fr. Jon on several occasions to design and implement three (3) powder coated, solid steel donation boxes to go on the north lot, center and south lot due to generous response from community to donate for non-church related parking. They will be fabricated to resist pressure from weather and tampering. Turnaround time to complete before summer;
12. Mike Davis provided us with a very nice, ornamental palm tree and had professional landscapers install, with surrounding decorative stones;
13. Someone ran over our mailbox, with their car. We don't know who but it was on a Sunday evening (3/24). Fr. Jon researched the best type of replacement, now allowing us to have a locked entry for security of check receipts, etc.. Lia negotiated with the USPS on the new location. JP installed in ground;

14. Purchased four (4) more coffee push-pot dispensers due to demand. Hearing nothing but positive comments about the new coffee making system;
15. Dishwasher is working great but could use some more volunteers to sign up on Sundays and learn how to operate;
16. The Health Inspector gave us our annual visit, making recommendations on how our kitchen can be safer and how to train volunteers on food handling precautions;
17. Purchased a new HP laptop just for operating the Carillon system. Florida brownouts disrupt the timing mechanism. Laptop should stay "on" and engaged for hours without power from now on;
18. Chaz Conlon, husband to Vestry member, Denise Hughes-Conlon, inspected our west roof line, that goes over the classroom and Food Pantry. It seems to be in good condition;

Things to accomplish between now and June:

1. Install new Calvary street signs (4);
2. Install new donation boxes (3);
3. Pour & spread a gravel, install new materials on south lot to improve parking;
4. Install sectional, pvc picket fencing on south lot, preventing public access over grass;
5. Improve front marquee signboard;
6. Negotiate new housekeeping contract with someone "in house."
7. Evaluate our landscaping contract;
8. Evaluate sprinkler system and make needed repairs;
9. Evaluate dumpster contract with City of IRB;
10. Re-stripe parking lines in north lot;
11. Install smaller dishwasher in Barge Hall or Parish Hall kitchen;

### **Parking Signs Update**

We have been most successful in receiving donations from beach and restaurant parking in our north, south and west lots. Due to this success we have decided to postpone the third-party mobile app signage with the company Parkmobile for the time being. Instead, we are moving towards fabrication of more durable donation boxes to add convenience for community giving, along with appropriate signage to invite the public to our Church. All donations are checked daily and being recorded for the use of restoring and enhancing all things related to our parking lots. By 2021 we are projecting to resurface the north lot and by this summer we hope to put a new permeable grade gravel permitted by the City of IRB in our south lot that serves most of our Food Pantry patrons.

### **Parking Lots have big Outreach potential**

Volunteer opportunities exist with this newly discovered "ministry" that is rapidly becoming a part of our Outreach. If you would like to become a "docent" that engages and invites the public to visit our facilities before or after they go to the beach, please let us know. It may include greeting the public on a Saturday afternoon in front of Church or placing flyers in windshields of cars parked in our lots about upcoming Church events. This is something we look forward to seeing develop as it acquaints people to who we are as Christians.

We realized this potential after Fr. Mike and Julie Day were docents at Winterfest the last two years, being successful in inviting new people to come and be part of our Church. We feel that once we invite people to Church, show them hospitality and include them in worship, God will take care of all the rest.

If you would like to assist in the annual Beachfest Parking Lot fundraiser, please see Lisa Kingston for details. We anticipate parking nearly 400 cars on that day, Saturday, April 27<sup>th</sup>, ALL DAY. Funds go to support our youth programs.

## The Legacy Society


