Leave a Legacy

"My soul doth magnify the Lord," knowing Jesus lives and reigns within our wonderful Church. I've always said the Church is a unique miracle, touched by God's own hand with love and care. The Church is the legacy that Jesus left behind for all of us to live out the miracle which is a place of healing for a broken world.

I am honored to say Lynne and I became recent members of The Legacy Society, which is commonly referred to as our endowment fund. We noticed right away that Calvary is endowed by so many people who love this Church, who love their clergy, and love each other. This is what brought us in. This is a warm and loving church. That same love is something that binds us together and helps the Church to operate in more ways than one. The Legacy Society is truly one such way that deserves magnification.

Many of you may not be aware of two important pieces of Church history. The first is, throughout all the difficult years where there have been wars, plagues and economic depressions, the Church has found ways to survive. One way has been from certain people who gave considerable sums of money at the time prior to, or after, their death. There "Will" was that the Church, a place which gave them spiritual comfort, joy and meaning through the years, would continue its operation. Without receiving such an inheritance many

Churches would have closed over time but love for the church, through leaving a legacy, helped others to magnify the Lord.

The second piece of history relates to us specifically. Calvary reported a deficit of \$240,000 since the year 2000 (~\$16,000/year). In only one of those fifteen years did our revenue exceed expenses. Yes, only one (see the trend on the bar graph under Stewardship section). The amazing part to this story is that during the same duration we accumulated and invested a little over a half a million dollars into our Legacy/ endowment Fund and even took on a major renovation. "How," you may ask, "is this possible when we have had such a deficit?" The answer is from the gifts given after death by the souls of the faithfully departed who loved the Church. The faithful members who give by pledged or non-pledged income, the visitors who place money in the offering plate, the specific designated gifts love the church, this is a fact and helps us build our budget each year. But the combination of those gifts have been approximately 90% of our operation. The rest needed, above the top towards our endowment, has been from the reception of bequests by those who left a special legacy.


"My soul doth magnify the Lord," is the joyful expression of love by the Holy Mother, Mary, who gave birth to our Savior, Jesus, the greatest legacy. Thank goodness, as Jesus continues to reside in each of us because of her sacrificial giving. The Magnificat has been one of our canticles that has lasted throughout all generations of the Church. Found in the Gospel according to St. Luke, Mary's song is about the miracle of being a lowly servant who magnifies God's presence in her heart. This personifies the carrier of God's love in the world as a mother for her expectant child. Much has been mentioned already about dollars and cents as a beneficial legacy, but someone like Mary, who did not have a lot of money, left behind the beginnings of a church. She had a great love. Out of love we are moved, like Mary, to pass along something to our future generations. We, the people of Calvary, are the benefactors of those who came before us. The structure of brick and shingles, altar and organ are only as good as the people who come to worship within and carry on the legacy. When we give our legacy of love to the Church we give our love to God, as a mother for her child, as a groom for his bride.

Consider the challenge Jesus gave us, "Go forth and make disciples of men." Consider the womb of where we worship, where we learn how to love God and to love others. Jesus left us the Church as His legacy. It is a precious jewel in God's crown. Here, you may find Him in Word and Sacrament. With love and obedience, continue to sing aloud, "My soul doth magnify the Lord" and leave your legacy upon the world.

The Role of the Deacon

How blessed we are to have Deacon Melissa with us. She enriches our lives continuously and plays a vital role in all aspects of our parish. We thought you might be interested to know that the role of the deacon is clearly defined in the Book of Common Prayer.

It is the function of the deacon to prepare the altar for the celebration of the Eucharist, preparing and placing upon it the bread and cup of wine (BCP, p. 407).he deacon's function in preparing the table and placing the bread and wine upon it has been traced from the second century. At times the deacon brought a small table into the room or into the center of the congregation after the catechumens were dismissed and the prayers of the people were concluded. A white cloth was placed on the table. Offerings of bread and wine were brought to the table by the people, or the deacons moved among the people to receive the offerings. Bread and wine in sufficient quantity were put out for the sacrament, with the rest set aside for the clergy and the poor. In subsequent years the altar was prepared before the liturgy in some places. This change has been associated with the development of low Mass, in which the altar served as both pulpit and table. The 1979 BCP states that at the presentation of the offerings, representatives of the congregation will bring the people's offerings of bread and wine, and money or other gifts, to the deacon or celebrant (pp. 333, 361). The BCP also directs that at the ordination of a deacon, the newly ordained deacon prepares the bread, pours sufficient wine (and a little water) into the chalice, and places the vessels on the table before the Eucharist (p. 546). The BCP clearly identifies the deacon's function in preparing the table and receiving the offerings at the Eucharist. (The Episcopal Church Official website)

47th Annual Diocesan Convention of The Episcopal Diocese of Southwest Florida

On October 16-17 Calvary was represented at the annual Diocesan Convention in Punta Gorda at the Port Charlotte Convention Center by Fr. Jon Roberts, Deacon Melissa Sands, Delegates Derek Good, Judy Marx, Jim Yanacheck and Alternate Marilyn Clark. Lynne Roberts and Greg Donham were in attendance. The theme of the Convention was "Mercy in Mission: Healing a Hurting World." Friday began with Morning Prayer followed by several informative workshops. These included Safeguarding All God's People; Creating a Strong Youth Presence; Understanding Mission and Going Through: Navigating Your Church in times of Change. Following lunch, Brian McLaren, author, public theologian and leading figure in the emerging church movement presented the keynote speech to the convention about "The Christian Faith of the Future." The late afternoon workshops were: Get Ready Before Disaster Strikes; Training for Eucharistic Visitors and Eucharistic Ministers (presented by our own Deacon Melissa); Hang Out with Brian McLaren and Unpacking General Convention 78. These workshops were very informative and well presented. Following the workshops, we enjoyed a beautiful Holy Eucharist service in the evening. It was very impressive to see all our Diocesan cleray vested and present. Our Bishop, Dabney Smith was not able to attend the convention because he is undergoing bone marrow treatment, but he did address the convention Saturday morning in a video presentation. Please keep Bishop Dabney in your prayers. Afterwards our delegation enjoyed a time to socialize at a quaint, local Thai restaurant and share what we learned.

Saturday was the day the business of the Convention took place. The day began with Morning Prayer followed by introductions, appointments, report on nominations and elections, report of Treasurer and budget presentation and resolutions report. Lynne and Greg attended a luncheon and meeting for the Clergy Spouses where The Right Reverend Barry Howe presented about the work of the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem (AFEDJ). There was also a Ministry Fair, held both days, where the Diocese shows off the missions and ministries that we have in this Diocese and in our companion Diocese of the Dominican Republic.

Volunteers make it happen



A Husband's Love

Devotional by Peter Kennedy

"Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her" - Ephesians 5:25

Author Jill Severson, in her book "Love to Last a Lifetime," describes her mother and father's marriage that has lasted over 62 years. Her mother struggles with Alzheimer's disease and her father had his voice box removed. She writes: "He can't comfort his frightened, sick wife. But my mother can't remember the surgery so she demands, 'Why won't you talk to me?' He shakes his head back and forth. This makes her angrier. 'He just shakes his head and never talks to me,' she shouts to the room. She calls him selfish, uncaring, and a host of hurtful words and names. My Dad's eyes are misting. He's a tough man. Strong language is not foreign to this old Norwegian painting contractor. But he understands what she is really saying: 'I'm scared and confused.' That's what really breaks his heart.

Finally my mom decides that she could spend the night 'here' (her apartment). She turns as sweet as she had been horrid. 'You poor man,' she tells my Dad. 'Swede, you are a good man, we can stay here can't we? We'll be fine for tonight.' She goes to her room and gets ready for bed.

Coming to my Dad one last time before retiring she puts her hands on each arm of his chair, gets her face about a foot from his, and with the most endearing look asks, 'Do you have something to say to me?' 'I love you,' he mouths.


'I love you too,' she replies. And then goes to bed.

They have a love that lasts a lifetime, so ingrained that even the loss of memory and voice cannot touch it."

Worship

"Did You Know"

For the next few months, I will be using some "Frequently Asked Questions" about the Episcopal Church. Hopefully these will be helpful to you. If anyone has a question you would like to have answered, please contact Judy Marx at Jmarx9450@aol.com or 596-3014 and I will try to find the answer for you.

Q. Why does the Episcopal Church have communion every Sunday?

A. Because this is what the early Church did. In the New Testament, Christians met together every Lord's Day to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and to be nourished on his body and blood. The Church celebrated the Holy Eucharist (Communion) every Sunday for centuries. It was not until long after the Protestant Reformation that some Christians decided that it was not necessary to do so.

Q. Why do many of the people bow or genuflect (kneel briefly on one knee) at their pew?

A. There are two reasons.

- (1) The altar is the place on which Jesus comes to us in the elements of consecrated bread and wine. The altar is therefore a symbol of the sacrifice of Jesus Christ upon the cross just as the American flag is a symbol of our country and those who sacrificed their lives to keep our country free. Just as we salute the flag by placing our hands over our hearts, we also "salute" the altar by bowing our heads toward it.
- (2) Many churches reserve the sacrament (the consecrated bread and wine) on or near the altar so that it may be taken to those who are ill or who for other weighty reason were not able to attend the Eucharist. When the sacrament is reserved, out of reverence for the real presence of Christ, it is customary to bow deeply or genuflect (kneel briefly on one knee) as a symbol of respect for our Lord's presence.

Q. Why do people in the congregation kneel in prayer upon entering their pew?

A. To prepare themselves for worship. They pray for themselves that they might worship our Lord in spirit and in truth; they pray for the congregation; they pray for the priest and other ministers who will be leading the worship; and they pray for any other matter may be weighing on their mind.

Q. Why does the congregation remain quiet before the worship begins?

A. There are two reasons.

- (1) They remain quiet out of reverence for the house of God and the Lord's presence upon the altar. "The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him." (Habakkuk 2:20)
- (2) They remain silent so as not to disturb others who may be praying around them.






