Collect of the Epiphany (January 6th)

O God, by the leading of a star you manifested your only Son to the peoples of the earth: Lead us, who know you now by faith, to your presence, where we may see your glory face to face; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Gifts.

We had a wonderful Christmas this year. At Church and in our home we were glad to find gifts. These were the gifts of love, joy and peace. The twelve days of Christmas were individual moments in time to intentionally cherish these gifts. These should not be taken lightly as they represent what our Lord and Savior offers us today. In this season of Epiphany this act of giving resonates and we have a gift exchange. At Christmast, Jesus gave us love, a gift of great value and one that was very expensive as it cost him his life. Jesus gave us joy, a thoughtful gift and one that shows we were considered from the beginning of time. Jesus gave us peace, a gift of comfort and one that will be everlasting through our many ups and

downs. During Epiphany we will be like one of the wise men who comes bearing gifts in exchange for the gifts of love, joy and peace.

It's good to know there are still some places where we can observe gift exchanges between the world and our Savior. Recently two friends of ours in the Church invited us to go hear the Candlelight procession at Disney's Epcot. Walt Disney was a devout Catholic and within his life pursuits he intended to give something back to Jesus in whom he adored as a faithful Christian. This processional event has been going on for years and includes a full symphony, hundreds of caroling choristers and a narrator to retell the nativity of our Lord. Toward the end of this amazing testimony of God's gifts given to the world we heard the lyrics, "God of wonder, God of light, God of royal beauty bright, westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to thy wondrous light." We are just like the three kings, I thought. We have journeyed from afar along God's highway, going to a wondrous light, and we hope for Christmas never to end. The love, joy and peace we felt is to be everlasting and the season of Epiphany is about the manifestation of Christ, the light of God, in our lives. It is a time of giving our gifts.

The three men who traveled to see Jesus in the manger were wise because they came to find the Messiah, the one who would provide these gifts to the world. Balthasar brought a gift of value. He brought gold as it is in exchange for God's love. Caspar brought a thoughtful gift. He brought frankincense as it is in exchange for God's joy. Melchior brought a healing gift. He brought myrrh as it in exchange for God's peace.

What gifts do you bring to Jesus? Consider Calvary the new manger scene. Have you pledged at Calvary? Have you offered what is valuable, what is fragrant and what is healing to the one who was sent to save the world? We are the world. Our family, our neighbors and our community, are all the "world." The Church is centered in the middle of it all. It is a simple place, like the manger, where we still find the wood where Christ entered. It is a thoughtful place where we still find the Word of God being revealed. It is a healing place where God, mysteriously so, takes us by the hand and loves us through our moments. Who wouldn't want to exchange a gift? Let us all join the chorus and sing triumphant praise about the good tidings that God has bestowed upon us and give to this blessed Church in which He lives. I would like to see this as one of our best years, not a season or two that lasts only a few weeks then fades away when the weather warms. Consider making a lasting commitment at Calvary and offering the many gifts that God has given you.

<u>Listening for God Through Mark Adult Bible Study</u>

Bible Study will begin on January 7 as part of the Wednesday evening program. After a brief service at 6 p.m. to help us shake the cares of the day, we gather in the Parish Hall for a delicious meal and time to socialize with friends. This is followed by an hour of Christian Education. The program ends and we are on our way home by 8:15 p.m.

In our Sunday worship this year, the Gospel proclamation is predominantly from St. Mark. To help us understand more about what we hear in Church on Sunday, we will be studying Mark's Gospel, the shortest and earliest written Gospel, in the Wednesday night adult Bible class. The study is called "Listening for God Through Mark" and is a series of eight guided lessons covering most of this book of the Gospels. The lessons are based on an ancient Bible study method called "Lectio Divina" or Divine Reading. The method is ancient, but the study book is written with a contemporary audience in mind. The goal of Lectio Divina is to help us gain understanding and hear God's Voice speaking to us.

If you don't think Bible study is for you, I would like to encourage you to join us for a few classes to find out if your assumption is true. Previous classes have been very lively and enjoyable. The participants have agreed that when we hear the readings in Church, there is a new awareness and understanding of God's Word.

The study book is inexpensive (\$5.50) and could be shared by a couple. It is an easy read, sprinkled with interesting quotations from theologians, writers and Scripture to help illustrate the reading for that lesson. Deacon Melissa has copies of the book "in stock" so please see her if you would like to buy one for use in the class.

For the January 7 class, we will be studying the first chapter of Mark, verses 1 through 20 (Mark 1: 1-20).

February 16 – Language of Flowers by Vanessa Diffenbaugh



ALTAR GUILD: Symbols Drawn from Flora


Early in the fall, the Altar Guild shared with you that we would produce several articles this year on the Symbols of the Church. We hope you not only enjoy the following information but that you will continue to

appreciate future articles.

Trees and flowers have always been symbols of virtues and persons. Many of the plant symbols found in the Western church have very ancient origins. The acacia bush, harks back to the burning bush out of which the voice of God came to Moses. The acanthus refers to the peace of Eden, the almond to the choice of Aaron as priest (hence Aaron's rod), and the apple to the Fall. The rose is one of the happier Christian symbols, as in the rose of Sharon that signifies Christ. The mystic rose represents the Blessed Virgin; the Christmas rose, the Nativity. Crown of roses are, in turn, the symbols of St. Cecilia, St. Dorothy, and St. Theresa. The cypress was an ancient symbol of death and mourning. When combined with palm and olive, it becomes a symbol of the Blessed Virgin. In general the symbolic associations with the Blessed Virgin Mary are common to the Christian world.

THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY: There are a number of flowers associated with Mary: the almond recalls the budding, blooming and blossoming of Aaron's rod; the violet suggests humility: jasmine's white color and fragrant scent symbolize the Virgin's purity and sweetness. Lilly of the valley, thanks to a reference in the Song of Song's, is regarded as a symbol of the Immaculate Conception. The iris, also called a "sword lily" is another reference to Mary's suffering. But the lily has become the primary symbol of the Blessed Virgin whether it be in the fleur-de-lis or in portrayals of the Annunciation from the Middle Ages on. (Reference: Outward Signs - The Language of Christian Symbolism by Canon Edward West)

The Beach Community Food Pantry: "A Place of Hope"

The Beach Community Food Pantry, or "Food Pantry" is a mission of Calvary Episcopal Church (1615 First St., Indian Rocks Beach) and will celebrate its 10th anniversary in the New Year. Its slogan is "Food from the Heart" and endeared by thousands in need who visit every year, looking to receive relief and support when so much has been lost in their lives. They come for food but we find they are in need of hope more than anything. We call our visitors "patrons" as they are treated with dignity and respect. They leave here with provisions of food and a sense of warmth and love. Many have said how thankful they are for this benevolence, not knowing how they would cope with the struggles of life without the Food Pantry. We continue to seek support from our Church and community and hope that as you read this, you will consider doing so.

There are many outspoken volunteers who have made the Food Pantry so successful. The succession of directors, in particular and in historical order include Carol Beauchamp, Harvey Brillat, Chuck & Peggy Pond and, currently, Connie Curran, all of whom are faithful members of Calvary. The inspiration behind the Food Pantry began on a Wednesday night service just prior to Thanksgiving. A man was noticed in the back of the Church, worn, distressed and humbled. He approached the clergy afterwards asking for assistance. After pulling some food items from the kitchen shelf, the man was presented with a bag full that would be a gift

to give him hope on a cold night. Only a few people came the first year but as word got out, a consistent base of patrons were established. Since then, the Food Pantry has grown and built trusted alliances with supporters in our community that include, but not limited to, the following: Rotary of IRB, Action 2000, IRB Homeowners Association, the Town of IRB, Pinellas Suncoast Fire & Rescue, Pinellas County Sheriff's Department, the United States Postal Service (annual collection), Church of the Isle, St. Jerome Roman Catholic, Christ the King Lutheran, Slyce Pizza, Keegan's Restaurant, Guppy's & E&E Restaurants, Grasso Funeral Home, Publix and of course the IRB Newsletter and its affiliate newsletters with Bob Griffin who graciously publish such articles. All of these relations help to make this a Beach Community Food Pantry, "A place of hope."

The Food Pantry would not survive without donations of food and financial support from generous people within the Church and our nearby community. It also would not exist without a large pool of volunteers who help operate it on a routine basis. Some of our most committed and loyal volunteers provide their time and effort because they feel fed by helping others. The Food Pantry is open Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 10am to noon of every week and behind the scenes are additional volunteers who are our buyers who supplement what extra food is necessary. They work to gather and stock the food on our shelves so that it will be a reliable source of support for the many patrons who show at our doors. They shop and transport food from local bulk suppliers and donors such as Publix, Feeding America, Sav-A-Lot and Aldi's, to name a few. The multiple sources of charitable giving by individuals from those who drop off canned foods, etc. to the larger civic or corporate sponsors truly make this a Beach Community Food Pantry, "A place of hope."

Maybe you would like to support this vision to give hope to a hurting world. See firsthand the goodness of giving by volunteering a few hours of your week and stock shelves, help buy or transport food products, meeting and greeting our patrons, organizing your church or organization to provide a canned food drive for the Food Pantry, or raising the money individually to help for the common good. Come and see what we are all about. This is the Beach Community Food Pantry where we serve "Food from the Heart" in "A place of hope." Christmas Shoe Boxes

Just before Christmas, I was privileged to meet two true men of God, Father Mario from Redeemer Church Mission, Arcadia and Father Richard Lampert from St. Mary's in Palmetto. These men minister to the poorest and least fortunate among us, the migrant workers. They both said how fortunate they were to be chosen to minister to these families and how they

got back so much more from them than they could ever hope to give. What a humbling thing say, and they both meant it from the bottom of hearts.

They were so deeply touched by the Shoe Boxes other gifts provided by the parishioners of Calvary and St. Dunstan's. In many cases, what provided will be the only Christmas that these children will receive. I felt bad that we were only


able

After this wonderful experience, I am more dedicated to the wonderful Shoe Box Mission. I have a goal for next year and a challenge. I would like to be able to drive down three vans filled with shoe boxes. I have already had requests from two of our parishioners who would like to go. Let us keep the Christmas spirit alive all year by planning and filling throughout the coming months. With Father Jon's help, we also plan to issue a challenge to all the churches in the Clearwater Deanery to join forces with us to help us complete this mission.

My personal plan is \$5 a week. I know that I waste at least that much each week on non-essential items that I pick up in the check-out lane. Instead I will put it toward items to fill shoe boxes. By the time Christmas rolls around next year, I should have quite a pile of loot for the children. Please, won't you join me in helping these poor unfortunate children? Let us show them the true meaning of Christmas by giving from our heart. If all of you join in, we may need more than three vans. Wouldn't that be truly wonderful?

Leave a Legacy

As we begin the New Year, our legacy continues. 2015 will bring new opportunities and changes to Calvary. Change is not easy for some, but

necessary to continue the growth of our parish. When we asked Father Jon to become our Rector, it was with the understanding Calvary needed new energy and new ideas to grow. He accepted the challenge, but he cannot do it alone. Needless to say, we have some obstacles to overcome not only internally but externally. It is not easy being a Christian in this progressive, secular world. But, as the song says, we shall overcome. It is our faith that gives us strength to persevere.

So where do we begin?

First and foremost is our income. This is never an easy subject to discuss in a church but our parish depends on the giving of members. For many, stewardship is a private, personal decision between us and God. I believe it is important everyone to know we are not meeting the financial needs of the church. To put it in perspective, we have been operating on a bare bones budget for the past five plus years. In fact, we have been running negative numbers. Being lean and mean is important but is not a path for sustainable grow. This is our challenge for 2015. Under the leadership of Father Jon, I know we will pull together to take steps forward. As we continue our journey, it is very important we do not lose our identity. What is it that makes Calvary a wonderful Christian community? It is, of course, the people and the people serving God. Let's all remember whom we serve. Losing sight of this simple point can be destructive.
