Storm

Last month I gave a sermon based on the Gospel according to St. Luke, 12:46-56 to which you may request the full printed version by email. Many said it was a fine sermon because it put into context our national community with the emphasis on what I called, "The Appropriation of the Cross." I went on to tell about the parable Jesus gives in which we should see trouble coming, like a storm that rises in the east. Little did anyone know a storm like no other would follow the day of Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension that would change the course of humanity. The storms keep on coming in the hearts and minds of people who continue to refuse not only Jesus' warnings, but go further to denounce His power and sovereignty.

We have learned much about storms recently. We observed a tropical depression that became a tropical storm, which then became a hurricane. We saw it develop off Cuba. We knew the water of the Gulf was warm enough and given the right atmosphere could grow the force of wind and rain. It did all that. We saw it coming. With a high surge expected, volunteers saw the signs and came to prepare the church as best they could. Having water enter the building would not have been good. You never really know how bad a storm can get until you're in the middle of it. You never know if you are prepared enough but you make your best effort to buckle down. We were fortunate, moreso than the people north of us who took the major landfall of the class I hurricane. Why am I sharing all of this

with you? It is because the life of the Christian is always about preparing for the worst but hope for the best. I love that saying. When the storms in life come our way, we prepare for the worst but hope for the best. We go to the hospital when the fever doesn't break and we are coughing up blood. We go visit our friend in the middle of the night when they call to tell us their loved one just died. We go support our brother or sister when a divorce is unavoidable. The storms surely do come.

I have found that God brings people together when times get tough. It is His way of letting our roots go deeper, when our neck is just barely above water (so it feels). God is comfortable and compass-ionate knowing that houses are going to blow away and real estate is going to be sunk. What God wants to see are people who are always preparing for the worst but hoping for the best. What God loves is when we do this together. I would personally like to thank all of you who followed my recent Facebook video posts ("vlogs") filmed at Calvary the day of the storm. So many who said they were praying for our church gave me personal comfort. I had many of you nearby praying as well as friends all over the country. How comforting that made me feel. I was so touched by Julie Heinicka who came over to inspect the areas of the church that were vulnerable. The two of us prayed that all would be well. I was touched when the Fisher family came over and laid sandbags in front of our doors, just in case. This is just an example of the power of prayer, the benefit of closeness by a compassionate community of believers who truly prepared for the worst and hoped for the best.

Leadership Commission Report:

Your Vestry will begin its formal meetings again in September. We believe that over this past year we have defined a point of clarity in our role as we function within the Ten Great Commissions: Worship, Christian Education, Stewardship, Property, Pastoral Care, Connections, Missions, Outreach, Leadership and Fellowship. We are tasked with the following major responsibilities:



<u>Vision:</u> Our primary function is to support the vision of this parish which is to be known as Christians living in a Christian community. It is identified by the diversity of our congregation built upon our qualities of spirituality, compassion, respect, and love as Jesus taught us in the Bible. We will be recognized within our Diocese and by our local community for our worship, catechesis (our teaching), stewardship and evangelism (our message to the world). The vision defines where we will be if we accomplish our mission which is to know Christ, and to make Him known to others. As members of the Vestry we articulate and safeguard this vision at the direction of you, the members of our parish.

<u>Values</u>. We must insure the values of Christ's church. The values question responds to how are we trying to live out His vision. We continuously work toward having in place means and programs that will helps us achieve the vision. This is a major focus for us.

<u>Stewardship</u>. This responsibility is about the financial integrity of the church. With the assistance of our very capable Finance Committee, namely, Maria McDaniel (Chair), Mike Alford, Keith Oeste, Greg Donham, Betsey McKenna, and Tom Monk, our Treasurer Phil Beauchamp, and the Rector, Fr. Jon Roberts, the Vestry evaluates the financial recommendations to make decisions on a routine basis. An annual audit of all funds is conducted. An approved annual budget is given to all parishioners. Basically, our Finance Committee gives support to our Vestry, who are the guardians of the financial life of this parish to ensure that the church has a long-term future.

The role of the Vestry is to model a cycle of giving, "nurturing a desire to pledge and a passion to explore the road to the tithe." It is our hope that we can fully establish a parish-wide culture of generosity in the years to come. Making a pledge during our annual stewardship campaign is so necessary by all of our parishioners. The tithe has always been 10% of all financial gifts one receives in the year and we strive to reach this goal that God commands. It is with grateful hearts that we thank all of you who give of your time, talent and treasure to the work of God and His Son, , Jesus Christ.

<u>Support the Rector.</u> Finally, and most important is the Vestry's key role in supporting Fr. Jon as he leads us toward "knowing Christ and making Him known." The Rector plays such an important role in helping us achieve our Christian responsibilities. Fr. Jon gives the leadership team the opportunity to reflect and analyze and offer positive suggestions for all major decisions that impact our parish. Fr. Jon is facilitative and open to input and feedback on the operation of our church. We are grateful for his leadership and continue to pray, "that he may, both by his life and doctrine, set forth thy true and lively Word, and rightly and duly administer thy holy Sacraments."

Several resources were shared with us and one of those was a small book titled, <u>The Liturgy Explained</u> by James W. Farwell. Throughout this coming year we would like to share thoughts and ideas from this text.



One of the ideas is that being Christian - "contrary to a widespread misunderstanding - is not really about holding certain beliefs about God

and the world, but about becoming a certain kind of person before God and in the world. Being a Christian has a great deal to do with being a person who is fundamentally grateful to God for life, committed to living in communion with others, and acting compassionately toward other beings just as Jesus Christ has done."

What is Christian liturgy? "If the Bible is the Word of God in the words of human beings, the liturgy is the deeds of God in the actions of those men and women who would live in God. The purpose of baptism is to make us cleansing waters and healing and strengthening oil; the purpose of Eucharist is not to change bread and wine but to change you and me. It is we who are to become Christ for one another, and a sign to the world that is yet to hear his name. This is what Christian liturgy and Christianity are all about." Robert Taft, Eastern rite Catholic scholar of Liturgy.

The second church, Trinity Episcopal church in downtown Ashland, (trinitychurchashland.org) is in the heart of Oregon's Shakespeare festival and was first built in 1895. Everyone who works there seems to have some literary or musical talents. The musical director sang some solos that were wonderful and you just knew he must also sing in the local musicals. No choir that day. The children's Sunday school, Godly Play, is based on the Montessori method of teaching and resources are available on their website. They also had one of the first female rectors in the area. The present rector, Father Hutchens, spent 25 years as a US diplomat in China and Africa and then was ordained in 2008. He

also taught biblical languages and literature and speaks and reads many modern and ancient languages including sign language.

Both churches made us feel very welcome especially when they found out we were from Florida and it was just after the Orlando Tragedy.

Carol's Culinary Corner

Here we are in September already and the summer behind us. Speaking of September, did you know that September is the National Chicken month? Yes it is! Let me introduce you to America's favorite protein for health and the daily budget. It is very versatile as it may be enjoyed hot or cold and readily absorbs flavors of spices and seasonings.

Chicken is very low in sodium and a 3-ounce size has approximately 31 grams of protein which is more than half the recommended daily allowance of 46 grams for an adult female. Not to mention only 1 gram of saturated fat and less than 4 grams of total fat. Just wait until you hear how even better it is for; It is a great source of vitamin B3 and vitamin B6 which helps the body in its metabolism, immunity and blood sugar level maintenance. It also contains vitamin B7 and vitamin B12 helping with the cell growth and aiding in nerve cell and red blood cell maintenance as well. This great bird also contains iron for oxygen transport and cell growth along with zinc for our immune system function and DNA synthesis. Now that's jam packed full of good things and definitely something to "crow" about.

An average adult American will consume about 83 pounds of chicken a year!! However, before preparing / handling chicken there are a few safety tips to remember:

- 1. Always, always, always wash your hands before and after handling chicken. Very important!
- 2. Chicken should be stored at 40 degrees or cooler.
- 3. Chicken must be defrosted in the fridge or cold water.
- 4. Disinfect the prep area before and after preparation. THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT!!
- 5. Cook chicken until it reaches 165 degrees Farenheit.

ANNIVERSARY CHICKEN

You will need:

2 Tbsp vegetable oil

6 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves

1/2 cup teriyaki basting sauce

1/2 cup Ranch style salad dressing

1 cup shredded cheese

3 green onions, chopped

6 strips of bacon cooked crisp, and then crumbled

1 Tbsp chopped fresh parsley for garnish

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.
- 2. In a large skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add chicken breasts, and saute 4 to 5 minutes on each side until lightly browned.
- 3. Place browned chicken breasts in a 9x13 inch baking dish. Brush with teriyaki sauce, then spoon on salad dressings. Sprinkle with cheese, green onions and bacon crumbles.
- 4. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes, or until it reaches 165 degrees and is no longer pink and juices run clear. Garnish with parsley and serve!!!

Michael Dornan - The 10-year-old son


Brian Dornan - The 7-year-old son

Pastoral Care

Obituary, Dorothy Alonzo Cox



90, died Thursday, Aug. 18, 2016. "I was born in Tampa the seventh consecutive daughter with one younger brother. I was blessed by being in a large family nurtured by a wonderful mother and father. Indian Rocks Beach was a comfort zone which held many pleasurable moments in our family beach cottage. Our favorite times were going over to our citrus grove in Pinellas County where we rode our horse, Dixie and fished in the pond. As teenagers, dancing and entertainment was done in the homes and our home was the most active.

After graduating Hillsborough High School, I attended the University of Tampa. I married Lt. J. D. Cox who I had dated in high school. We were married for a year and a half before he was sent to Korea. He was killed in action a few months later. In the year 2000 during the 50th Anniversary of the Korean War in Seoul, I represented the Gold Star Wives of America, receiving the South Korean "Ambassador of Peace" medal along with returning Veterans. After J.D.'s death I returned to college and graduated from the University of Miami with a BS degree in early childhood education. Later I received my Masters in Library Media. I taught elementary school in Tampa for three years at Lutz. Then I taught overseas for the military for 21 years in Libya, England, Philippines and Puerto Rico. My travels have been varied and exciting! There was a Mule Safari in Switzerland, I was charged by a one tusk elephant on an African Safari, went on wild boar and deer hunts in the Philippines and on a pheasant hunt on Lord and Lady Cranbrook's estate in England. I was part of an Archaeological Dig in Swaziland, South Africa with Dr. Price Williams of England, doing research on "Earthwatch" to benefit the Swaziland Museum. I did my first skeet shooting in England on the private range of the First Vice-President of the Rolls Royce Company. Eventually I went on to win the naval station San Juan Club opening Ladies Champion trophy in skeet shooting. During my ventures I collected many artifacts depicting the culture of the countries I visited or lived in which I later donated to the American Overseas Schools Historical Park and Museum in Wichita, KS.

During a difficult time in my life I read the following words on a bulletin board and I took them to heart. They have helped me throughout my life. The author is unknown. "The clock of life is wound but once and no man has the power to say just when the hands may stop at late or early hour. Now is the only time you have. Live, love, work with a will, place no faith in tomorrow for the clock may then be still".

Since retirement I have enjoyed membership in several organizations. I was Worthy High Priestess of "Lebanon Shrine #6 Order of the White Shrine of Jerusalem" as well as Florida State President, also a member of "The Tampa Woman's Club", "United Daughters of the Confederacy Tampa Chapter 113", "Daughters of the American Revolution DeSoto Chapter", President of the "Military Officers Wives Club" at MacDill AFB and the "St. Andrews Scottish Society."

Predeceased family members are her sisters, Lucille Brown, Louise Chancy, Rosemary Brabham, Ernestine Higgins, Catherine Carbaugh and her husband Captain Joseph Dean Cox. Survivors include her sister Helen Dunbar, brother Leslie Alonzo, many beloved nieces, nephews and their families and lifelong friends. Throughout her life, Dorothy's effect on those who knew her was that she was a shining example of encouragement, unconditional love and inspiration. She brightened the lives she touched in ways that no one else could.

There will be no memorial service held at this time. Dorothy and her sister, Helen, lived at Indian Rocks Beach for 18 years. They were both active at Calvary Episcopal Church. It is their mutual wish to join their memorial services into one service at a later date.

Eucharistic Visits

When a Calvary parishioner is not able to be present in church due to illness or infirmity, especially over a prolonged absence, it is possible to receive communion. The clergy and small team of licensed lay people (Lay Eucharistic Visitor, or "LEV") can bring communion to you at home, in the hospital or at the rehab. The Deacon and lay ministers are licensed to bring communion on Sundays. We use a brief service and bring you bread from the Sunday Eucharist, which was consecrated by Father Jon.

To request a Eucharistic Visit, please contact Father Jon or Deacon Melissa, using the contact information in the Sunday leaflet. Please do not contact a lay minister directly with this request. Planning ahead is helpful, when possible, since there are so few of us who can provide this pastoral care. A last minute request on a Sunday may not be possible to be met that week. If family members will be present, please let us know so that we can bring enough bread to include them in the service. Please contact Deacon Melissa if you are interested in becoming a "LEV"

Prayer Team

Calvary has a dedicated group of people who quietly are praying for the needs of fellow parishioners, friends of Calvary, and for special prayer requests daily. You can read the current prayer list in the Sunday announcements. The prayer team invites you to take this list home and join us in prayer. In addition to the published Sunday list, there is another prayer list for people who have long term needs, or who have asked for confidentiality and prefer that their name is not published each Sunday. As of this writing, there are 30 more people who you do not see on the Sunday list. You may ask why we do this. In addition to the several confidential requests mentioned before, we feel that people may be overwhelmed seeing a list that is extremely long and which does not seem to change. This is our way to keep the Sunday list fresh and yet still lift up those who are in need of prayer.

If you would like to be a member of the prayer team, please let Deacon Melissa know. Making intentional prayers for the parish is something you can do from home since several of our members are winter parishioners. We meet in person infrequently, but communicate often via email, so you can be anywhere. If you are skilled with Microsoft Excel, we would love to have you join us and become clerk to this ministry group, a position which is currently vacant.

When you request a prayer, please do so in writing on the special prayer request cards. A verbal request may not get communicated and recorded. To keep the published Sunday list current, we leave a name in the leaflet for one month, unless we get an updated report. And please remember that the Sunday list is printed early each week. If we get a prayer request late in the week, the prayer team will begin praying, but it may be the following Sunday before you see the name printed in the leaflet.

Holy Unction

One of the seven sacraments of the church is called "Holy Unction" when the Bishop, Priest or Deacon lays hand on a person, prays for them and anoints them with oil. The practice has typically been observed at times before a surgery, rehabilitation to follow, or in an assisted living situation. These are necessary times in which to administer the sacrament, however, why wait? It is always best to treat the condition prior to the risk of mass infection and perhaps death.

The first way to treat an illness is to acknowledge you are sick. Too many times we say we can combat the problem and do not need assistance. We can shut down the body and rely on home remedies of rest and over the counter medicines. These may not suffice. So many illnesses are caused by stress; not enough rest, worriedness, anxiety, and fear. The effects of these on the mind, targets the body and the two together effects the soul. Treatment should be given and equated in the Christian tradition by dosages of prayer, meditation, reading the Bible and going to Church. For some reason this particular illness isn't going to go away, even after we do these things. We now need to take a new course of action. We need to seek professional care and advice.

In the 23rd Psalm there is the line, "he anointest my head with oil" and this is where we see the power of Holy Unction. The clergy are trained to diagnose such illnesses as they relate to particular stresses that are in your life. We "scan" the body with prayerful discernment and lay hands on you in prayer. In the same manner to which we baptize, we anoint you for healing, in the name of the Trinity. So much good comes from this practice and you are encouraged to seek it as often as you like. Missions

The Spirit to Serve

In July, Calvary Episcopal Church sent two adults and seven youth into a desperate area that needed assistance. It was far away and overlooked. They took with them the spirit to serve. The place they served was... Nashville, Tennessee. It is most interesting how we think of missionary work to be located, far, far away overseas, in a third world country perhaps. That feeling may have been more prevalent thirty years ago but today we are finding a great deal of poverty, right here in our own country. The welfare rate has increased in most urban cities in the US, like Nashville, like D.C., like Tampa. It is a terrible cycle of decline that is interlaced with drugs, crime and poor education in many of our communities.



Our team was given a glimpse of a poverty stricken area as we joined a hundred other youth from groups that arrived from places such as Minnesota, W. Virginia and Virginia. We were given assignments to serve the poor and the outcast and it was really hard work. Some of us worked with the, "Grow, Cook and Share" initiative with the Nashville Food Project that brings local produce, raised by immigrants and churches, to the table that serves weekly dinners to the homeless and indigent at several locations in the city. Others spent time at assisted living facilities where they listened to the stories of the elderly who suffer memory loss, held their hands and prayed with them. We had teams that power-washed homes that belonged to the disabled and elderly. They cleaned their yards and pulled their weeds from their gardens. We had teams that went into summer schools where the programs offered only the basic sense of child care for low economic classed families. We brought in games and read them books and made their week fun. At the end of the day we took showers from a hose outside and ate leftover frozen food for dinner.

At the end of the week, our minds and bodies were exhausted but our spirit was strengthened. I recall loading up the van and bringing the youth home. We stopped at a Cracker Barrel that morning off the interstate. The air condition felt so good and we just sat there looking at the menu. When the food arrived, we all just looked at it. With a different set of lens, we shared how grateful we were and how much we thought about the endearing moments with the people we served, people whose conditions were likely not to change. With a little guilt mixed with a lot of gratefulness, we bowed our heads and thanked God for what we were given. The event was called "Community of Hope" managed through Group Workcamps, and that is exactly what we experienced. Our time, talent and treasure was invested so that we could give hope to an area desperate to be reminded that they are loved. How great it is to have a spirit to serve.

We would like to thank the Church for supporting this event as well as our sponsors, most notably the Indian Rocks Beach Home Owner's Association for their generous gift.

This made me realize how lucky I was and also my selfishness.

There are so many more kids in these circumstances and here I am in an ideal home with a stable family and all I do is complain. I'm so privileged to have the life that I do. However, not only the kids were great but the teachers were also outstanding. They had so much passion to help these kids pass to the next grade. I couldn't stop myself from being amazed if I tried. At the end of the everyday I know that I am blessed and God is watching over all of us. It just takes an experience like this for us to know." – Jordan Coker

"This is my experience of the Week of Hope Mission Trip in Nashville, TN (2016). During the mission trip I was placed in a crew that was assigned to an assisted living facility (nursing home) where we passed out daily sheets and played bingo with the residents. We also went around to the rooms and talked with all the residents about all the things they liked.

Another fun part about the mission trip was when we got to go out on our own for the night. We ate at a restaurant in downtown Nashville and then we went to an ice cream shop. We also walked up onto The Pedestrian bridge. But before all that we went to the biggest YMCA in the world. We played basketball and swam and took showers with hot water (which by the way was the best part).

The worst part (no offense to the cooks) was the food. I remember one day the eggs were so bland even salt and pepper didn't help them. Another bad part was the beds which were basically hard as rocks. Then there were the showers which were tents with a hose. The most amazing thing is that none of us really cared about all of those little things. All we REALLY cared about was doing our jobs, being friendly and having a good time. We left feeling good and happy and we met a lot of really nice people who shared cool stories with us. All in all, we CARED for others and that felt good."

"My experience at the Week of Hope was very good. I got to teach kids how to read at the church and we would design our classroom conversations around the book we were reading. Our book was called Chocolate Fever and after reading a couple of chapters we would go ahead and draw and cut out chocolate treats. It was a lot of fun to teach kids but there were also times when I didn't know what to do and it made me appreciate how teachers at my school are always prepared. In the end we made a musical rap about our book Chocolate Fever, and sadly I don't remember it. But it was still

a great experience overall and I made some new friends." - Jacob Alford

"On the way to Nashville I kept wondering what this year's mission trip would be like. Would it be like last year's, or maybe completely different? Upon arrival we soon learned it would be the latter. We would be staying in an old brick Methodist Church, most of which had no air conditioning. Luckily the rooms did, well most of them. I soon learned the next morning that I would be working at a children's center run by PTM, (Preston Taylor Ministries). I was assigned to work with 4th and 5th graders, helping them to and from classes and just being a friend to them.

On the second day we started working with the kids. It was amazing to see all of these children brought together at this ministry. It really makes you respect what they are doing. We got the chance to help them with reading. Many of the kids had English as a second language skills, so in English, they were reading 2nd or 3rd grade books, but were in 4th or 5th grade. We got to play games with the kids like soccer or basketball. And we talked to them at lunch. It was very amazing to see kids with English as their second language using the bible as effectively as they did.

Through this ministry these kids could find shelter from the unforgiving streets and gangs of this particular area of Nashville. Eventually however, we had to leave. On the last day all of the children were sad, some crying. The same group of kids who would barely talk to us on the first day were emotionally connected to us, and us to them. It was amazing to learn how impactful we can be to other people after just a week. I really enjoyed the mission trip and would do another one." – Kenneth Fisher

Youth Programs Funding

The financial support we provide to the youth of this church for mission trips, conferences and other related youth programs are beneficial and necessary. The youth are, after all, "the future of the church."

Our programs (ie. Mission trips, conferences, fun-related events) are financially possible as we offer discounts based on their church activity, scholarships where there is need and fundraising opportunities when there is an expectation for them to earn a portion. Last summer, Calvary gave nearly \$2500 to all of our youth and chaperones who attended the mission trip and Christian conferences that were out-of-state programs, alone. The youth were expected to commit in being active in church and to work for a certain amount of fundraising events in exchange. Our parking lot proved to be one of the most effective ways to offset much of these expenses.

On Labor Day, Monday, September 5th, from 9am-3pm, Susan Koester will direct the parking lot once again. Any youth and/or adults able to assist, for any of the hours, are invited to help. There is a sign-up sheet for that event, along with other opportunities in the Calvary Lot for future fundraising (Octoberfest, etc.).



The color will shine forth with the warmth of welcome and show forth the light and presence of the Holy Spirit to all who enter.

The Junior Warden's Report

June-July-August Property Report, 8-22-16

- Blair's AC directed more airflow into the food pantry to aid in cooling it better. Update. Food
 Pantry is fine, Classroom cannot get lower than 79 degrees. Looking into other options. This used
 to be a 10-ton unit and was replaced with a 5-ton unit a few years back. We could opt for a
 new 10-ton unit and move the 5-ton unit to replace the 1993 Sanctuary balcony AC unit. Stay
 tuned.
- We had a Duke Energy power issue where one leg dropped out and caused Food Pantry refrigeration issues and Parish hall electrical issues. Thanks to Fr. Jon, Phil and Carol Beauchamp for being there and assisting in the problem resolution.
- The Stained Glass was reinstalled in the front doors of the Sanctuary. Art-Glass Studio did a fabulous job. The front doors loose veneer was repaired, the doors primed and we are still in the process of adding Red paint to the door, both inside and outside. Thanks to Larry Hite for his donation to aid in the costs for paint and supplies. The hinges will also be replaced and hopefully the aluminum trim will be painted with antique bronze paint to also spruce them up. Stay tuned.
- The outside door to the west classrom was patched together to buy more time. It needs replacement.
- The ropes on the flag pole deteriorated and we lost the rope feed through the pulley. We were able to feed new rope through the three lower pulleys, but unsuccessful in getting the top pulley fed. Julie contacted the Pinellas Suncoast Fire Department, Station 28. They came out, performed some ladder training and threaded a new rope through the upper pulley. Thanks to the Firefighters for their support. That is the way to feed a new rope through the flag pole pulley!!





- In the Parish Hall the shade covering the northern most east opening was repaired and is once again fully functional.
- The push vacuum was rebuilt with a new case, and fan impeller. It is fully functional once again.
- Plans are moving along to add a new concrete pad and area for a small dumpster. The final location and details are being worked out.
- All fire extinguishers were inspected and serviced as needed.
- One coat of varnish has been applied to the north doors of the church. Additional coats will be applied as time permits.
- An independent roof Inspection service was contracted in June to evaluate the current situation
 of the roof. "Do we have life left in the roof or should we bite the bullet and look at replacing
 it?," is the question. We have not yet received the report. I have contacted him to try and
 obtain the report. I consider this past due.

• Father Jon had a Duke Energy Audit performed. There is a report that I have not yet reviewed. LED lighting is one of the recommendations that always comes up. There may be some grant money available to aid in swapping everything to LED's. This is something that I am looking into.

PLANS

- Father Jon has a project to remove the wall between the Barge Hall and the (old) sailing room and is joined by Bob Lima and Billy Coker with the concept. See Father Jon for more details.
- Add the concrete pad for the dumpster with surrounding walls on the south parking lot.
- Trim the oak trees in the south parking lot.
- Add landscaping to south end of the church and along the sea wall.
- Remove sailing boat racks along the sea wall.

Treasurer's Report - July 27th, 2016

June 2016 Financial Summary

Calvary's financial position, for the period Jan-June, 2016 is following relatively close to budget. Actually, Revenues are better than budget by \$41,592 or 22%, primarily due to an anonymous Fidelity Charitable gift of \$50,000 received in May. As directed by the Vestry, \$25,000 has been transferred to the Calvary Endowment and Investment accounts with \$25,000 remaining in the Calvary's Operating Account. Operating Expenses are \$14,839 or 8% below budget.

Calvary's cash position as of June 30th is \$61,607 in the checking account and \$13,724 in the Unrestricted Investment Account.

The Finance Committee (Maria Gonzalez, Chair) continues to meet monthly to review the Financial Statements and any other financial matters that arise.

The Audit Committee (Keith Oeste, Chair) will meet in August to perform Calvary's annual Audit as required by the Diocese of Southwest Florida.

The Investment Committee (Mike Alford, Chair)) will meet likewise to review Calvary's Endowment and Unrestricted Investment account performance with our Financial Advisor at Merrill Lynch.
