The Road

Fourteen of our Calvary "Missionaries" recently returned from the distant, far-away land of... Wisconsin. I took with me, Lynne, Emma, Watson, Maria, Carmen, Kevin, Elyssa, Jordan, Grace, Jacob, Kenneth, Garrett and Brandon, on a journey to be servants of the Lord for a week. Looking back, we have so many fond memories, learned so much and increased our faith in God.

I will share something funny that happened when we were there. Wherever we stopped, the locals wondered why we decided to spend our summer there, of all places, working in community

service. Even the other youth groups who joined us at Week of Hope, from Indiana, South Dakota and Illinois wondered the same, why we would go to a less than exotic place. We discovered that most Midwesterners believe we Floridians have it made, living in paradise. Why would we leave our great state to stop at places like Kenosha, Racine or Milwaukee? It turned out to be a great opportunity to share with them our culture and why we felt called to move away from the norm. It also helped us relate to the biblical story of Jesus' disciples, who journeyed away from the pleasantness of Galilee, carrying the good news to distant, far-away lands, down "the road."

Our missionaries gave their personal reports in Church of their "God-sightings" while away. I had a good number of our parishioners tell me afterwards how much that personally meant to them. They enjoyed hearing about their service to the elderly in assisted living and nursing homes, to the mentally and physically disabled, especially the youth in the Easter Seals summer programs, and other various sorts such as the Jewish Community Food Pantry, in downtown Kenosha. Their lives were changed as they related to this year's theme, "The Road."

Group Workcamps, the host organizer, used that defining moment, when Jesus appeared on the road to Emmaus to relate how our own eyes are opened to the life-changing effects of being a servant to others. In the Collect for the Transfiguration (listed above) it says that Jesus' appearance glistened in white; obviously because of his divine Spirit. Several moments on our trip we felt as though we were in God's presence and could see such divinity at work. As time passes, the disciples returned to their homeland, just like we did and began to fall back into their old ways, so much they forgot what Jesus sounded like. Through the retelling of the Emaus story our youth learned something pretty important. No matter how far away God seems, through His son, Jesus, God is always right there with us. One of our youth said how sad it would be to forget this feeling once they returned home to their routines. How inspiring and sobering this statement was to remind us all to keep walking down that road with Jesus beside us.

Have you noticed how you can get caught up in the normative cycle of life, the routine, sometimes falling into monotony or slump into a bit of spiritual apathy? If we don't walk down the road hoping and expecting to see the Messiah, then what are we doing? Traveling with the Lord on the road enables spiritual development towards righteousness and truth. Disciples, missionaries for Christ, are sent out looking to find Him. Through Word and Sacrament; through prayer and service, Jesus meets us on the road. He tells us the same stories but in a different place. When we come home, we are encouraged to apply what we discovered and we are ever so thankful for our family, our food, our bed, our time and our health. Distancing ourselves from our normal routines helps us to avoid taking advantage of them or to overlook them. God is in all the details of our life. We sometimes push God away when things are just expected.



The Blessing of the Backpacks

Public and Private School resumes early in August. Our families will once more enter the ritual of intensive learning after the summer reprieve has ended. Our children will venture into school, heavy laden with coursebooks, writing instruments, calculators, notebooks and so much more. Fr. Jon will extend a blessing upon these tools and the carrier for them, so that the load is not as heavy a burden. The prayer will be dedicated towards their abilities to learn and discern, how God is at the source of all education that trains and equips the student to do His work in this world.



All youth, pre-K to college, are encouraged to bring their backpacks on August 6th, placing them in front of the altar prior to the service. The Blessing will be given at the time of the "Peace" and can be picked up when motioned.

Service Schedule for July/August

We resume our usual 8/10 am services on Sunday, August 13th.

On Wednesdays, beginning September 6th, the Holy Eucharist will be offered at 12:00 PM along with Holy Unction for special prayers for healing. The practice of anointing with oil for healing and deliverance from all forms of deprivation have allowed a personal time of prayer that gives immeasurable comfort to those in pain, who grieve or anticipate an operation. Please consider making this one of your practices, taking a lunch break in the middle of the week.

On the same Wednesdays, Evening Prayer is being offered at 6:00 PM and will be led by either clergy or lay members. This is an important "office" of the church which provides a deeper examination of Holy Scripture on a routine basis. If you would like to be an "Officiant" who leads an EP service, please ask Deacon Melissa or Fr. Jon.

When we get into the seasons of Lent/Advent, teaching series will be offered once more for adult Christian education and formation, allowing us to also include Evensong services. Both the teaching and celebration of such kind in those seasons has been very fruitful.

"Moreover, we will bring to the storerooms of the house of our God, to the priests, the first of our ground meal, of our grain offerings, of the fruit of all our trees and of our new wine and oil. And we will bring a tithe of our crops to the Levites, for it is the Levites who collect the tithes in all the towns where we work." – Nehemiah 10:37

Pastor Kevin Coughlin wrote the following memoir about the attitude of giving on his trip to the Philippines:

"On the northern slopes of the Island of Mendoro, there is a squalidly poor tribe of people known as the Manyans. Ninety percent of them are believers in Jesus. Their huts require repair after every storm. They do not know about indoor plumbing. Their concept of electricity is fluorescent bulbs driven by batteries, and only the very wealthy one percent of the tribe has these. The children go naked until puberty, and even then their rags are pathetic. All the people I met have bad teeth, and their bellies are swollen from malnutrition. But their eyes and smiles are warm, sparkling, and genuinely joyful.

They held a pastor's conference in April, where I was taken by a national pastor/friend. There were 80 pastors who represented about 65 churches in the hills. The biggest church there has 75 people in it. At the conference everyone was squatting in their breech-clothes eating rice and fermented fish-heads with their fingers.

Here was the topic of intense discussion: How do we dig a little deeper to get enough pesos to send along with three Christian missionaries from the tribe, Yangunsi, Gunye, and Makario? We need more resources to send these men to the lost souls on the island of Paloswan, so they can hear the gospel of Jesus Christ."

No matter how much you have, consider how to give to the Lord's work. Today in prayer, ask the Lord to give you wisdom on how to best give to His work.

Altar Guild News

We will bring to you in the next several Crier articles general information about the traditions of our church. We hope you find the articles interesting.

Is the Episcopal Church known by any other names?

Yes, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (DFMS) is the legal, corporate name of the Episcopal Church. When the church was incorporated 1821 its full legal name was the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant



Episcopal Church in the United States of America, but that name was changed when the church became international; the Episcopal Church is now in 16 nations. The church has also gone by several acronyms in the recent past, including ECUSA (pronounced "ee-KYOO-sah"), which stands for the Episcopal Church in the USA, as well as TEC for The Episcopal Church.

Where did the Episcopal Church originate?

Early English settlers established the Church of England in the original colonies of the United States, and in 1789, after the American Revolution, an assembly met in Philadelphia to unify all Anglicans in the United States into a single national church. A constitution was adopted along with a set of canonical laws, and the English Book of Common Prayer of 1662 was revised, principally by removing the prayer for the English monarch. Samuel Seabury was ordained in Scotland as the first American bishop.

Why was the name "Episcopal Church" chosen?

The Greek word episcopos means "bishop" or "overseer," which is used because the Episcopal Church is governed by bishops.

Who is the head of the Episcopal Church?

The General Convention, comprised of the House of Deputies and the House of Bishops, is the governing and legislative body of the Episcopal Church. The Presiding Bishop 2 is the Chief Pastor and Primate of the Church. The current Presiding Bishop The Most Reverend Michael Bruce Curry.

Holy Travel

The Mission Team stopped by two churches while they ventured to Wisconsin. On their first day, they visited the Chapel of St. Marys at Nashotah House Theological Seminary, which is where Fr. Jon went to train to become a priest. He shared with them much about the architecture and history of this 19th century, "Holy Space." It was in this chapel where so many Anglo-catholic priests were cultivated. We enjoyed a time of Compline the night before, and morning prayer, the next day before going to Kenosha. The other church we visited was St. Luke's Episcopal in downtown Racine, WI. They stopped by, before their return flight, on June 23rd, after noticing their church had a big sign, saying, "Open House, Please Come in and Visit."

The church is a legacy of a notorious priest, James DeKoven, and a commemorated "Saint" of the Episcopal Church. He helped construct Nashotah House and taught there in the 1870s. His influence with bringing the Anglo-catholic movement to the Midwest was legendary and not always supported by those more protestant. Several Bishops resisted the ornate placement of candles on the altar, the use of incense and emphasis on the sacrament. They made sure DeKoven would not reach the coveted position of becoming a Bishop and although he was nominated or elected to be a Bishop in three different dioceses (Wisconsin, Fon Du Lac, and Illinois) they or the Standing Committee refused to accept his election. In St. Luke's, on one of the walls, in the midst of such beauty and splendor, you

can see his name along with three Bishop "miters" that illustrate those instances of refusal. DeKoven would be disheartened today, knowing that only forty or so people attend the liturgy in this beautiful church each Sunday, on average to worship. On the other hand, perhaps he would rejoice knowing it has a vibrant feeding of the poor ministry, three days a week with hot lunches served to the growing homeless population of Racine.


HOA Grant

Food for Sharing from Publix

The Beach Community Food Pantry, once again, will be the recipient of pallets of food donations from the 'Food for Sharing' program.

'Food for Sharing' is a community supported program started by our friends at Publix, in 2009.

Twice a year in the spring and fall, donation cards representing three predesigned levels of giving are made available to Publix customers at the checkout counter. Once the customer selects a donation level, the cashier scans the card, and the amount is added to the customer's total order. Customers also have the opportunity to donate any amount they wish to help feed the hungry.

In 2016, customers donated over \$14 million to Food for Sharing, and since 2009, have donated more than \$60 million in total. Each spring and fall, these donations are used to purchase specific food items on behalf of the customers. Examples of food that BCFP get are: peanut butter, grape jelly, green beans, tuna, hams, mashed potatoes, fruit and more. These are all staples routinely distributed by BCFP.

Publix assembles cases of these food items, ships them to a store close to the participating food pantries (in our case, Publix at 10411 Ulmerton Rd, Largo) and makes these donations available for pickup. BCFP counts on its volunteers to help transport the food in their trucks and SUVs.

Our sincere thanks go out to all of the community who support this wonderful effort by donating the money that allows Publix to purchase and Home Depot to deliver, these necessary supplies. June Property Report, 6-22-17

I am providing an early June report as the holidays are coming up, the crier deadline is approaching, I have some vacation planned and a lot has happened in the last two weeks. So here it is. Thanks! Next report will be early August for July.

- It is still here. Had a discussion with Scott from Blair's AC and we discussed possibly putting in what is called a mini split system. This puts a new compressor outside and the in lieu of duct work and an air handler, each room receives its own evaporator system. Up to eight evaporators can be run off of the same system. This might be our best solution for the food pantry, classroom and old food pantry. Blair's is supposed to quote it and we will see where it lies. Stay tuned.
- This too will get done when time permits. The new classroom door still requires painting. No action since last report. I will be picking up paint and painting the door inside and out soon.
- The roof repair was completed as scheduled. The work they did was really good. The leak has been fixed. Let's make sure when we have another big rain storm.
- The metal weather stripping on the front doors was completed on the sides. I ran short of the metal weather-strip and will have to order some more to complete the top. Still need to order that part.
- No activity still. I will take this on this month. The Marquee sign out front exhibited some arcing
 and sparking. D'Andrea electric is going to upgrade the electrical box and rewire the area of
 concern. The base of the sign has been prepped and we are waiting for D'Andrea to
 complete the work. I have also asked D'Andrea to replace the 11 lights in the kitchen to LED.
 No scheduling information from D'Andrea yet.
- Paving project is finished with new stripes!
 This is definitely a great upgrade to what we had. Thank you to the Remark family for their donation to get this completed.
- No information on the cabinets in the kitchen. Stay tuned.
- We have a fence permit. The concrete has been completed! A new sidewalk by the food pantry, and new apron as you enter the south parking lot. Sidewalk repairs completed. Window sills repaired and the dumpster pad and adjoining sidewalk finished. I am working on the fence enclosure and have made good progress but we will see a slowdown as we have some vacation coming up. Completed by end of July for sure.
- New Carpet in Parish hall is complete! It looks awesome. Thanks for your patience as we worked through the mistake in ordering from the carpet representative. What a super nice upgrade! Thank you to Denna Shiben for her very generous donation to this long-needed project.
- The Cape Cod stain was purchased for the deck. It was on sale with \$40 dollar rebates on a 5-gallon bucket. I will try and accomplish this task soon as well.







Future Plans

- Add a sprinkler system landscaping to south end of the church and along the sea wall.
- Seal the woodwork around the west stained glass windows.
- Add another coat or two of varnish to the north doors of the Sanctuary.
- Apply sealant or a preservative to the deck.
- Looking to make our waterfront accessible to the community. Stay tuned for the vision.
- Small row of landscape edging and a row of variegated liriope along the new sidewalk in front of the food pantry.

First Street Project





From Cyndi and Derek Good

I think by now everyone at Calvary knows that Derek and I have decided to pack up and move to the small Island of Nevis in the West Indies. We wanted to share with you a little about the island and its people that influenced our decision to take this crazy journey. Nevis is the sister island of St. Kitts and together they are the smallest country in the western hemisphere. Being only 36 square miles, Nevis is a small island, but it is full of beautiful beaches, a tropical rainforest and approximately 70 churches. Some of the older churches date back to the 1600s



churches. Some of the older churches date back to the 1600s. There isn't a time during the day that Derek and I can't go to one of the beaches and be the only people there. We have hiked much of the rainforest, but still have not conquered Nevis Peak which is 3,232 feet high.



Over the years while vacationing on Nevis, we have met many locals that have become our close friends. Nevisians are some of the nicest, most friendly people we have ever met. They



speak in a variation of African Creole which is very fast and sometimes hard to understand. While there are beautiful resorts on the island, many of the people live in poverty, having 2 or 3 jobs that pay only a few dollars per hour. This is a picture of Sandy and myself hanging out at his fried chicken shack. Sandy works at



the Montpelier Plantation Inn as well, and has been doing property maintenance there for over 40 years. On Friday and Saturday nights he makes fried chicken for the locals in a little shack by his home.

Another one of our friends is Coach Eddy Richards. Along with working at the Friday night Water Department BBQ, he is the head coach at the St. Thomas Primary School. On our last visit, Coach Eddy told us about the Nevis Athletics Stadium that is being constructed. The track is Mondo's new high-tech design, and will be the 1st of its kind in the Caribbean and only the 3rd in the world. The project is the single largest investment in Youth and Sports in Nevis history. This is great for the youth of the island EXCEPT most of the children do not have running shoes. Derek and I attended Track and Field Day at Coach Eddy's school, and the majority of the kids participated barefoot. We have been working with Coach Eddy to collect as many pairs of new and slightly used elementary school children running shoes. They need almost 600 pairs for all the youth on the island. While we know we won't be able to bring that many, we have a goal to at least bring 100.

Thank you to everyone here at Calvary. We are so grateful to have found such a special place to worship and forge lasting friendships. We will be checking in periodically with our Calvary family and invite all to come visit us on Nevis...we have room! Here is our contact information, so please keep in touch. 

<u>Stewardship</u>

Treasurer's Report

When reviewing Mays "financials" the good news is the Year-To-Date numbers are strong. We finished with a net income of \$83,227.97 or \$3,400 ahead of 2016 YTD and significantly above our budgeted number of \$14,169. The Balance Sheet & Food Pantry numbers seem to be in order. The part that concerns me a little is our cash with all the projects the church had to endure this year. We show \$50,972.39 as of May, with a few remaining bills. Last year 2016 at this time we were \$81,182, due to a \$50,000 anonymous gift. Last year we did not have any big capital projects (eg. roof, parking lot paving & striping, concrete, etc.). When viewing Regions Bank on-line recently, all of our final checks looked to have cleared in June.

The month of May 2017 we lost \$12,473.57 due to several things. Parking lot revenue and Beach Community Food Pantry monthly revenue was below the budgeted numbers, Plate & Pledge Members were down. Last year gross profit was \$83,768, verses this year of \$21,650.75. Expense wise Food Pantry and Repairs & Maintenance were up over budget. Merrill Lynch came in with some nice market gains of \$13,201 that helped a great deal in the bottom line for May 2017.

In summary the Year-To-Date is strong, which is very important. Where we need to keep an eye on things or where we can improve is in building the Regions cash account throughout the summer. Reviewing your YTD pledges would be helpful. God Bless!!






